<u>From Brawner:</u> I am so thankful **Ms. Sullivan** texted me about (my student) being good today. All I'm used to is negative. My student has been trying to read everything that he finds, which normally it's like pulling his arm to read. He has improved in everything and is still so kind and sweet. We are so grateful for her being his teacher because we adore her. She treats him the same as all the other students.

From <u>Rich Teaching</u>, many teachers struggle with providing <u>students</u> with what they need the <u>most: someone who cares about them and their school progress</u>. As we know, bad things happen to everyone. However, students from poverty may not have the cognitive skills, emotional support, or the coping skills necessary to deal with adversity. The <u>key isn't to be sympathetic but to show empathy</u> and provide tools. <u>Empathy is the ability to understand and share the same feelings</u>. The good news is that empathy can be taught. There are many ways to show you care. Make your caring explicit. Not every student can read your face or body language, which might be your primary way of showing empathy.

Here are five empathy-response tools.

- 1) "I am so sorry to hear that."
- 2) "This makes me sick"
- 3) "We were worried about you."
- 4) "Are you OK"
- 5) "That's awful. I don't know if I could handle that as well as you are."

Judging a student's situation gets in the way. Don't tell him or her how to fix it. That comes much later. Again, try empathy first.

Legislative update (excerpts taken from the Texas Association of Community Schools): The Texas Tribune's Evan Smith interviewed Lt. Governor Dan Patrick on Wednesday morning and asked if he intended to hold school finance hostage to school choice. Lt. Gov. Patrick replied that "hostage" isn't a very nice word. He explained that he and the Governor were elected because the people want choice, and that he intends to move forward with school choice right away. While they are still in the process of writing school choice legislation, he suggested it would include education savings accounts (ESAs), business tax credits, and special education youchers.

Lt. Governor Patrick avoided directly answering questions on many issues, but he was eager to give his opinion on A-F. "The A-F system is not going away." In Lieutenant Governor Patrick's eyes, A-F is a done deal and while they are open to suggestions of how to make it better, it is here to stay. The following is a telling exchange between Dan Patrick and Evan Smith on this issue, which shines a light on the real (unstated) reform goal of A-F.

Dan Patrick: Our A-F system is not going away.

Evan Smith: Does anybody outside the Capitol like it?

Dan Patrick: Schools that got A's and B's like it.

Evan Smith: That isn't a very long list, is it?

Dan Patrick: Maybe that's why we should have school choice.

It is going to be a **long hard session for public education**. It will take a fight to fix school funding, reduce testing, oppose vouchers, and address the A-F fiasco.

From <u>Rich Teaching</u>, there are many ways to show empathy and connect with your students. Just a **few ideas**:

One and Done: Do one favor, make one connection, or show empathy that is so powerful that an individual or whole class remembers it.

Two for Ten: Identify one or two students who most need a connection. For ten consecutive days, invest two minutes a day in connecting time to talk about anything.

Three in Thirty: Ask enough questions to discover three things (other than name) about every student you have.

Remember, empathy does not mean you let them off the hook for bad behavior. It means you care about the student. It means you want to help them get better so that he or she knows better options for next time. It is about you being an ally for how your students feel as much as how they behave. When the teacher is empathetic, you've just added another good reason for your students to come to school, especially to your class.

Good Morning GISD, I trust you are having another great week as we move into the fast-paced Spring semester and all the activities that will take place over the next few months.

- Congrats to our **swimmers** on their **4-peat district championship** last night! Our **boys and girls both won district** last night and had great performances all around. We will have a lot of swimmers representing us at regionals.
- I met with my SSAC (student) group this week. We had a great meeting as always and I can tell you they are proud of their school! They love the collegiate feel of the high school, the new furniture, cafeteria, CTE and fine arts spaces, and the many opportunities they have to take classes of their choice. They like having their teachers available in the teacher's commons, and they love the specialized classrooms they have access to. I know I learn more than they do when we meet, but it is always good to have a dedicated time to talk to our students and get their thoughts.
- Our theater program is putting on a production of Grease, starting tonight. There are shows all weekend and I hope you will take the opportunity to get out, support our kids, and see a great show!
- Today is Inauguration Day for our new president. It is a day that is always interesting to watch as we witness the peaceful transition of power from one administration to the next. No matter what your political views, it is a great demonstration of democracy and we wish President Trump much success in tackling some very difficult issues. We also wish President Obama and his family a graceful transition to civilian life and some well-deserved rest.

<u>Legislative Update</u>: On Thursday, Senator Kel Seliger and Representative Dan Huberty had a joint press conference announcing companion bills that would make Individual Graduation Committees (IGCs) permanent. Currently, only 13 states still have passing state exams as a requirement for graduation and almost all of those have some sort of "escape clause" similar to what the IGCs offer for students. Few oppose the continuation of IGCs, but those that do are vocal and will likely force a fight to keep these alive.

Early this week, the Senate and House filed wildly divergent budget proposals, reflecting their different priorities. Senator Jane Nelson filed the Senate budget. Her budget comes in even below the figures projected to be available by Texas Comptroller Glenn Hagar last week. The Senate proposal includes cuts in health and human services, public education, and higher education. The senate cuts in public education are estimated at \$1.5 billion. While the Senate budget accounts for funding population growth in schools, it does so using local property taxes, rather than funds coming directly from the state budget.

The House, in contrast, proposed a budget that is higher than that proposed by the Senate, and notably higher than Hagar's projections. The House budget supports enrollment growth, as well as an additional \$1.5 billion that could only be spent if the legislature reforms the school finance system. The House budget also includes additional spending on Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program. The House is proposing to pay for these programs through cuts, deferrals, and possibly dipping into the Rainy Day Fund, which is estimated at over \$10 billion. (Perhaps this is the rainy day we have been saving for.) In a press release, Speaker Straus said, "The initial 2018-19 budget puts additional resources into public education, child protection, and mental health while increasing state spending by less than 1 percent."

From <u>Rich Teaching</u>, every day you get up an d come to work there's a narrative in your head. The narrative is you making plans for what will happen, what you will do, and how others might respond to you. Now, ask yourself, "Was that an average day?" What if you could have a great day every day? You can, and some people do. But, to get there you have to make changes in your life that would fulfill the criteria for a great day. Good Morning GISD. **Wow, what a busy week!** We have had activities going on every night of the week and our **students are being showcased around our state** in many different ways. I have a lot of information for you:

- On behalf of the GISD Board of Trustees, thanks to all of you who participated in thanking board members during Board Appreciation month. The board received many cards, letters, and other tokens of appreciation from our campuses and departments and they were very appreciative. They sometimes have a thankless (volunteer) job, and it is good for them to see the difference they are making in the lives of children.
- Our GHS F1 team has made a name for itself as the undisputed leader in F1 in Schools in Texas! Our F1 teams took 1st, 2nd and 3rd place this weekend at regional competition in Austin and became one of only 5 teams in the WORLD to break the 1 second barrier. Congrats to Mr. Gibson and all our students for representing us in such an awesome way. On to Nationals!!
- If you missed the theater and choir production of **Grease**, you missed a real treat. Our students put on a great show for our community and the talent on stage was just awesome. Thanks to **Mr. Weeks, Ms. Fisher** and **all the students** who had a part in putting on this great production.
- At our board meeting on Monday, our technology department was given an award from Extreme Networks for their work with wireless networking. We were also presented an award from Huckabee from two different magazines who have given our high school project several awards for innovative design.
- 73 Marine Corps JROTC cadets and five EMT students from Granbury High School returned last night from Harlingen where they conducted a three-day exercise at the

Marine Military Academy and endured over 55 hours of demanding training. Activities included leadership training, rappelling, zip line, obstacle courses, high ropes course, low ropes course, close order drill, paint ball - culminating with a four mile hike on Wednesday night. Thanks to our adult chaperones / GISD staff, Christy Pieren (GHS), Shannon Chancellor (MES) and Joe Overstreet (GHS) for their mentorship and dedication this week in helping with the transformation process.

- I attended the science fair last night and we had lots of great projects. From seeing if mash from an alcohol still is good to feed animals (it is), to which natural acid breaks down rocks the quickest (lime juice) to a student who actually made an artificial pancreas that could be helpful to diabetes patients. Many projects are moving on to regionals, and we had over \$2,000 in scholarships given to the winners to help them improve their projects for the next level. Thanks to Rene Jackson and all our staff who helped with these projects. Good stuff!
- I was not able to attend, but we had college and career night last night and our counselors always do a great job of getting many different schools and agencies to attend and show our students the vast array of opportunities that are out there for them. Thanks for the effort and I know it was a great event.
- Please see the attached documents related to a new recycling effort in our schools, called the Clothes Bin. We have placed containers in the same location as the paper recycling containers and any materials put in these bins will be recycled. It is a good program and proceeds from this program will be used district-wide for unbudgeted items.

Legislative Update:

This week there was not much news out of the state capitol as legislators are still settling in, so I will mention a little of what is going on in Washington as it relates to education. I was asked about the nominee for Secretary of Education, Betsy DeVos. Here is what I found, and unfortunately, it doesn't sound real promising for public education.

During the confirmation hearing, Ms. DeVos either displayed a lack of knowledge about the fundamentals of public education, or refused to answer questions that members on the Senate Committee believe are critical to her qualifications for the job.

Here are several notable moments during the confirmation hearing:

- -Ms. DeVos **refused to acknowledge that schools are no place for guns**, contending that there's one school in Wyoming that **needs weapons to protect students from grizzly bears**. "We don't carry weapons on school property," **an alarmed Ray Schulte, Superintendent** of the Park County School District 6 in Wyoming, subsequently informed reporters.
- -Ms. DeVos seemed to have **no understanding of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act**, known as IDEA, which requires that public schools provide free and appropriate educational services to all students with disabilities. **She suggested that the fundamentals of IDEA could be shifted to the states to enforce.**
- -Ms. DeVos refused to agree that all schools that receive public federal funds—traditional public, public charter or private schools that receive voucher money—should be held to the same standards of accountability.

As I have said before, 2017 is going to be very interesting, if nothing else...

- -"Sometimes my class seems a bit like a pep rally, but my students need it."
- -"The best part is near the end of class when students look at each other and say, "Wow, we did it!""

Change what you're doing and start influencing the student's achievement mindset. Next we'll look at some of the most effective achievement boosters of all time...

Legislative update

I was in Austin earlier this week and the buzz is all about what will happen in this session to affect education. A-F, education savings accounts (vouchers), standardized tests, and school finance are all topics of discussion that we will hear more about each week.

From the **UEA newsletter**: The Lieutenant Governor has made vouchers a high priority of his in this legislative session. Several variations on vouchers have been introduced over many sessions and have all failed to pass. The latest scheme is called "education savings accounts." The concept will allow the state to provide a fixed amount grant to eligible families to help offset tuition at private schools. One figure that has been discussed is approximately \$5,000 in a grant per eligible student.

If you think about it, there are not many private schools where the tuition is \$5,000 or less. This will not help disadvantaged students access a private school education. In addition, private schools do not operate under the same accountability as our public schools. There is no guarantee the money spent on private schools will produce outcomes greater or equal to our public schools. The argument against vouchers is this takes money away from public schools when they are already underfunded as it is.

In the past, the issue has always been blocked in the Texas House. The State Representatives have seen the flaws in the system and realized that weakening public schools is not the way to improve our education system.

Get Involved

Become familiar with the legislation that affects public schools. News, your school district, and your association are good sources. Share your opinions with your elected officials. You do not have to know the nuts and bolts of particular legislation. Sharing your thoughts as teachers and public school employees is important.

With all the movement and projects that have gone on with technology, I really appreciate what they have accomplished. I had students researching weather patterns on chromebooks, working on math applications on my tablets (an assortment of Kindle Fires, Asus tablets, and a few assorted other brands) and researching the sun with virtual reality on the iPods. Everything was working so well, the students begged me not to make them go to lunch or recess. Please thank everyone in technology for the work it has taken to get the network running this well.

Good Morning GISD, I hope all of you are wrapping up another great week in the district.

- I have gotten few questions recently about the Flex Days on our calendar and exactly what they are. First, just think of them as a normal work day for staff. A lot of students will be at school on those days. I think the best way to explain them is to think of them as an exemption day. Our goal for those days is to give students who have taken care of business all year to be finished with school early. Those who need to make up attendance hours, need some focused help on tests, finish up incomplete grades, prepare for summer retakes, etc., time to get some focused help. All teachers will be working with small groups of students on these days. And, all support staff will be here, as we will run buses, have the cafeteria open, etc. It will certainly require some organization and coordination as we move closer to those days. If you have further questions about these days, let me know.
- It is always great when our community gets to read about some of the wonderful things going on in GISD. Here is a link to an article on our culinary program that was featured in *Granbury Living* magazine. Great job by Allison and Breanne for representing us so well! http://lglmagazine.com/granbury-culinary-arts/
- Judy Gentry was honored at the Chamber of Commerce banquet with the Howard
 Clemmons Distinguished Service Award. Judy has worked very hard to build
 relationships in our community and she is a wonderful advocate for our CTE programs
 and GISD in general. Congrats to Judy for this well-deserved honor and for representing
 GISD so well!
- I made it out to the Brawner bracelet sale this week. The kids did a PBL project on making, marketing and selling products, and they were having a great time. I felt like I was in a real market with vendors trying to persuade me to buy their product. Great job staff and students!

<u>Legislative Update:</u> Last Friday, the **Senate Finance Committee took up the issue of TRS**. We learned at the hearing that Senator Joan Huffman intends to file a **bill addressing TRS**

ActiveCare. From her comments at the committee meeting, it appears that the bill will include key points from the interim report including:

- 1. There will be one plan with a high deductible (\$4,000 in network and \$8,000 out of network).
- 2. Only districts with fewer than 1000 employees will be allowed to participate in TRS ActiveCare.
- 3. Districts with fewer than 1000 employees will have one chance to "opt out".
- 4. The state will continue to pay \$75, and districts will pay a minimum of \$150.

They are clearly looking at saving State money and the above measures certainly do that! Eliminating all districts with more than 1000 employees would cut the pool dramatically. I would imagine we can also expect more of a shift to having employees and employers picking up more of the tab...

On a **positive note**, <u>HB 515</u> (Rep. VanDeaver) and <u>HB 1333</u> (Rep. Isaac) are companion bills that **requires Texas to test no more than required under federal law**. Representative Isaac is calling his bill **"The Teaching over Testing Bill."** Parents, teachers, and educators have expressed support for the bill thus far.

Parts of these bills:

- 1. Prohibits data from state assessments being used for teacher performance.
- 2. Limits state testing to no more than is required by federal law.
- 3. Requires the Commissioner to adopt rules to **choose nationally recognized norm-referenced assessments** as alternative assessments that can be used in **grades 3-8**. *This promotes local control by **allowing districts to choose from a list of tests** approved by the Commissioner.
- 4. Revises the accountability system and changes the weight of various domains. Most importantly, it reduces the weight that can be based on state tests in Domains 1-3 from 55% to 25%.

*This bill would require a federal waiver to a	allow #3 to occur,	as currently all	students must
take the same test.

From <u>Rich Teaching</u>, a student who seems lazy or unmotivated for one teacher will often work hard for another teacher. This simple fact shows us that it is the teacher that makes the difference and the achievement mindset changes everything. The achievement mindset says, I can build student effort, motivation, and attitudes to succeed. They are all teachable skills. The research is solid that student's expectations of their success in class has a whopping effect on student achievement. Low-performing students expect to struggle and if you ask them what their goal is, it may be to just "pass the class." But, these students will not cut it in a high performing teacher's class. Effective teachers create the climate and expectations starting on day one and never, ever back off them. Pursue goals for your class with a high expectation for mastery. When students get questions right, or reach their micro goals, celebrate and continue interacting for even higher-order learning. If they struggle, help them uncover the false assumptions or strategies. Help them grow. If you give up on students, they'll quit, too.



Legislative Update: In the legislature this week, the Senate State Affairs Committee voted to send out a bill on payroll deduction to the Senate floor. This bill would stop the horrible practice (tongue firmly in cheek) of allowing state employees to use payroll deduction to pay their "union" fees. (Texas is a non-union state for teachers, but this would include dues to UEA, ATPE, TSTA, etc.) This is considered a top priority for Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, along with his school choice voucher program. Texas Professional Educators director said, "This bill is both unnecessary and discriminatory, and the legislature should focus on issues that actually matter." Law enforcement union leaders came to speak out against the bill as well. President of the Austin Police Association said, "You are picking on people who make \$30,000-\$40,000 a year." The author of the bill, Senator Huffman, was asked if she had heard from local elected officials or administrators that this type of payroll deduction process was an issue. "I have not personally received a complaint," she said...

From <u>Rich Teaching</u>, every one of the strategies in this book is powerful, but <u>giving fabulous</u> feedback may be the holy grail. As soon as you see progress, you get inspired. With quality feedback, the goal moves closer and hope rises. That's how it works for your students, too. Quality feedback has clear, shared goals, establishes progressions, provides actionable feedback that moves learning forward, activates students as the owners of their own learning, and allows students to track their big-picture trends. Here are a <u>few examples of things you and your students can do</u>:

- -Ask more questions in class.
- -Review work and talk it over.
- -Summarize the learning daily.
- -Preview learning before class.
- -Work closer with a study buddy.
- -Create a mind map or graphic organizer of the content.
- -Ask the teacher for **specific help**.
- -Look up difficult concepts.

Savvy teachers use feedback to stay in the know. Students cannot control everything that happens to them in class, but through student feedback, they can respond to your teaching. Feedback is the substance for positive change in your work. Seek it out, use it, and enjoy the difference.

Good afternoon, GISD. What a beautiful week of summer weather (in February)! This has been a great week to get outside and enjoy some activities, sports, etc. Of course, I think it will be in the 30's in the morning. Good old Texas weather... A few things:

- We had a great Board Meeting this week where we filled up our new board room with student achievement and recognition. We recognized, state swimmers, F1 team, history and science fair winners, our spelling bee winner and the counselors from all of our campuses, who are some of our unsung heroes in the district. It is always great to see our students and staff being recognized at board meetings to highlight just a few of the many awesome things we have going on in GISD.
- I spoke to Mrs. Gill's career exploration class this morning at AMS. We had a good time talking about interests, career pathways, education, and ways to find a job you love, so you will never have to work a day in your life. Many of them already know what they want to do, or at least have an idea of their area of interest.
- If you want to see some high quality baseball, we have our **Pirate Baseball tournament** going on this weekend. Get out and support the Pirates when you can.
- We hosted a powerlifting meet on Tuesday with lots of lifters from many schools coming to compete in Pirate Pavilion. Thanks to all the coaches and volunteers who helped put on a great meet! We are also beginning softball, track, golf and are in the middle of our soccer seasons. Something is going on almost every night of the week. You should never be bored.

Legislative Update:

In an Appropriations Committee meeting this week, **Teacher Retirement Service (TRS) Executive Director Brian Guthrie** focused on the TRS-Care shortfall. Several challenges, including **rising health care costs** and the **significant cost of non-Medicare retirees'**

healthcare, are drawing down the TRS trust fund and lagging rates of investment return are making such spending rates unsustainable. Guthrie admitted that if no changes occurred in the current system or legislation that TRS-Care would close down. (This is something we should all be concerned about. This is also why there has been a lot of discussion recently about moving all TRS insurance to a high deductible, health care savings account plan. I am sure we will hear a lot more about this in the next few months... JL)

In budget news, the state share of education funding continues to decline as districts continue to provide a larger share of the funding. In 2017, 41% of public education funding is coming from the state. In 2018, 38% of public education funding will come from the state. Donna Howard asked the LBB how much more the state would have to pay if it were to shoulder 50% of the costs to fund public education. For 2017 that number would be \$4 billion. Another interesting statistic is recapture as a percentage of M&O (maintenance and operation budget). Historically it has been between 3 and 5%, but in 2018, recapture will account for 6% of M&O. Mary Gonzales and Gary VanDeaver inquired about a \$33 million decrease in federal funds. Apparently that was based on the state not meeting "maintenance of effort" (MOE) for IDEA part B.

TEA has also asked for an increase in funds for testing, and as they explained at a later hearing, it costs more to make shorter tests (as in those revised tests for HB 743). Yes, this is a good time to scratch your head and reread that sentence.

From <u>Rich Teaching</u>, so many teachers try a great strategy in isolation and wonder why it did not produce the effects that they had hoped for. The real reason is that most isolated strategies will fail. But the good news is the effects are cumulative. The more you do, the easier it gets. The process of mastering the more hidden or soft side of achievement is critical if you want to foster it. Your four primary tools for building a great attitude are modeling (the achievement mindset and high achievement thinking), learning to sow the seeds of

success, and consistently attributing connections. Each of these has a strong effect, and together they create a synergistic force that compels students to achieve more than they thought they ever could.

This was the biggest week in the legislature thus far as the House rolled out a school finance bill and the Senate rolled out their "bathroom bill." There were lots of people at the Capitol to testify on both of these issues. As more bills get voted out of committees, we will begin to get a clearer view of what we can expect in the coming weeks. Right now, the House and Senate are light years away from each other as to what each body deems important.

If you don't <u>purposefully invest thoughtfulness and clear positive actions</u> into your classroom climate, your job can become a nightmare every day. It will be filled with tardy students with motivation and discipline issues who act out, roll their eyes, and make comments behind your back. <u>Developing a rich classroom climate</u> mindset <u>will transform your classroom</u> into one amazing place to learn, and <u>you'll love your job every day</u>.

I hope you all have a **restful Spring Break!** Enjoy your time off, recharge the batteries, and be ready to come back energized and ready to go! **GO PIRATES!!**

Good Morning GISD, we are definitely in the middle of spring! We have something going on all the time and lots of great things happening on our campuses:

- This week, our **principals and instructional leaders** spent some time at **Baccus** with their **3**rd **grade PLC team**. As part of our own "administrator PLC" we are going to go around to a different campus each month or so to learn about the unique things going on at that campus and see what might apply at other campuses. OIUr first visit to Baccus was great! Thanks to Robert Herrera and his staff for welcoming us.
- I got to watch a "double dip" on Tuesday as our softball and baseball teams were both in action at home at the same time. The best part was that both our teams won district games and are off to a great start in district play.
- Last night, we went to Aledo to watch our **girls soccer team** compete in their playoff game. The came up a little short to a good Centennial team, but it was good to see them back in post-season, and I'm sure we will back again next year.
- As we make a push into our testing time of the year, just keep doing what you are
 doing. Teach our curriculum every day, check for success, and make sure to
 communicate with parents on areas where they can help with extra study, particular
 ideas and concepts their student is struggling with, and opportunities for extra
 tutoring, etc. I have no doubt that our kids will do fine.

Legislative Update:

From The *Texas Tribune*, after little debate Thursday, the **Senate Education Committee** voted 7-3 to pass legislation that would create two public programs subsidizing private school tuition and homeschooling expenses. Senate Bill 3, a priority for Lt. Gov. <u>Dan Patrick</u>, now heads to the full Senate, where it's also expected to pass. Corresponding bills have not been

taken up by the House Public Education Committee. The first program created in the bill, education savings accounts or ESAs, would give parents online accounts of state money to pay for private school tuition or homeschooling expenses. The second program, tax credit scholarships, would allow businesses to receive credits against their insurance premium taxes if they contribute to approved scholarship organizations.

From Moak-Casey, The Teacher Retirement System provides both pension funds for retired employees and health care benefit plans for both current and retired employees. Created by and funded in part by the state, each biennium the legislature must continue to fund and provide for TRS programs. In the 85th legislative session, stakeholders are focused particularly on the TRSCare and TRS-Active Care programs, because, unlike the pension fund which is actuarially sound, the health care program faces an estimated \$1 billion shortfall, which could be adjusted lower as the session continues. Legislative fixes in the past decade have helped the program inch along, but the legislature must provide a long-term remedy this session to sustain it.

Both of the issues above are critical to public education and would definitely have a major impact on public schools, public school employees and retired public school employees. There is much debate about "fixing" the TRS system, with very few of the "fixes" involving the state adding money to the program. Most of them will mean increased costs and loss of benefits for everyone. At the same time, the state's portion of paying for public education will reach a new low of about 38% of the state's budget. I have attached a document that goes into a lot more detail on the TRS issue if you are interested. JL

Good Morning GISD. What another busy week!

- We had some excitement Tuesday night as the straight line winds wreaked havoc on our area. We lost power at AMS and had to do some last minute rearranging of their day. The students got a free day at home, and the staff spent their day collaborating, checking on students at BTC and observing others. We also had a roof blown off of one of our portables at AES, but otherwise we came out OK. Thanks to all who were up early making plans and trying to make this as smooth a day as possible. Thanks to our great bus staff for being ready to run an additional route and getting our students home safely. We announced that we were going to run buses at 9:00, and by 9:12 all students were gone! That may be the quickest non-emergency evacuation of 800 students in the history of public schools, ha!
- At the board meeting Monday night, we announced that we are going to nominate our School Board as Region 11's Honor Board of the Year! They have been so supportive of the transformational changes we have made in GISD over the past few years and believe me, this does not happen everywhere. Their support is a real key to us changing our facilities, our focus on authentic learning, and supporting our great staff at GISD. We will be working the next couple of months on their nomination packet and we hope that the entire DFW area gets to learn more about the great support we have in GISD.
- We also released and discussed the UTA's Highest and Best Use Report (feasibility study) at our board meeting. For those of you who would like to see the report or use this as a model for your classes on how to write a quality report, you can find the link to the report
 - here. https://drive.google.com/file/d/0B4TwOZongYBhbC15Q1BzRGNLZzg/view We will be working with Weatherford College, the City of Granbury and other entities to insure those facilities and land that we vacated are put to great use in our community.
- Congratulations to our UIL Academic competitors! Granbury High School finished 3rd overall in academic competition, 41 points shy of runner-up. First place teams and individuals placing 1st-3rd, advance to Regional Competition, April 7-8, at Prosper High School. Along with our two Speech and Debate students who are advancing, Granbury

High School is sending 14 students to regional competition. Thank you to ALL our competitors and coaches for such a successful showing.

- I was in attendance Tuesday night as our **GHS Baseball team** got a **great win over Centennial.** All of our spring sports continue to be impressive and are making a strong showing for **post-season play**.
- Our **GHS Bass Team** had 5 teams out of 11 qualify for the regional tournament. To qualify they must fish a minimum of 3 tournaments and be in the top 50% in points at the end of the season. To qualify for State they must finish in the top 50% at Region. Region will be held at **Lake Palestine on April 22. State** will be held at **Ray Roberts on May 20-21.** Good luck to our anglers as they continue to compete!

<u>Legislative Update:</u> It is getting really busy in Austin as bills are starting to get passed out of committee and on to their respective bodies for full votes.

Yesterday, the Senate voted out the "voucher bill." With a vote of 18-13 it passed the Senate and will now move to the House, where it is expected to get less enthusiastic support. An amendment was introduced that would have schools who take vouchers administer the same tests that public school students take (so there could be some comparison on results). That amendment failed by the same 18-13 vote. Our Senator Birdwell voted FOR the voucher bill and AGAINST the amendment.

In another bill that educator groups are extremely upset about, the Senate passed SB 13, which is a bill that would take away your right to payroll deduct your Association dues for ATPE, UEA, TSTA, etc. The Senator who introduced the bill said that government should not be in the business of collecting dues. Interestingly the bill exempts firefighters, police, and EMT employees. It leaves public school employees, correctional officers and some state employees without an easy, secure way of paying association dues. In the debate, it was noted that no one had complained about this, no entity had said this was a problem, and many people believe this is an attempt to silence the voice of teachers because of our collective stance against vouchers. This bill also heads to the House for consideration. Senator Birdwell voted FOR this bill, as well.

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<u>From BTC:</u> Thank you, thank you to all the **AMS teachers who came out to BTC** during the power outage and visited with their students. **It means so much** when they get to see familiar faces and keep that connection with their campus!

<u>From a Parent:</u> I would like to say thank you to our **bus drivers** for their hard work and especially to **Mr. Torres** for making my son's **bus ride home so special.**

<u>From Parents</u>: We wanted to let you know what an exceptional program is within the walls of Brawner. We have had an awesome experience with the transition to Granbury ISD and wish we would have moved sooner (from a neighboring district)! After all, we have adopted the Brawner way. "Learning for all whatever it takes!" Have a wonderful remaining 2016-2017 school year.

<u>From District Staff:</u> Just wanted to let you know how much I continued to be impressed with one of our newer educators, Karl Kreusel at GMS. Legislative Update:

This week in Austin saw a continuation of several issues that we have been talking about. The House approved two bills that would not allow state dollars to be used for vouchers of any kind. This was after the Senate approved vouchers last week. So, it will be interesting to see where this tug of war goes...

The House committee on education passed some major changes to the A-F system. The common theme from educators is that we don't like the system, but if we are going to have it, at least make it a system that is somewhat fair and actually uses good data. We think this bill would partially do that, although there is still more emphasis on the once a year test than I would prefer. Whether or not the Senate will agree is still in question.

The Senate and House will soon be going to conference committees to try to reach some common ground on a variety of issues, so we will see where that goes in the coming weeks. Stay tuned.

- 3) Change the game by reframing assignments or activities.
- 4) Make it less about a grade and more about doing something spectacular.
- 5) Create ownership. Without this, the class is always a teacher-run event.

Students must have a stake in the game and a reason to participate. Give them a sense of control over their daily experiences. **It has to become "our classroom"** and be an optimistic one.

 the "Staubach era" it was a real honor for me to get to meet and visit
 with one of my childhood heroes. He was friendly, gracious, and just what
 you would expect (and hope) he would be. What an honor. And, for those
 wondering why we didn't publicize this event, we were under strict orders
 from the NFL and the Pro Football Hall of Fame not to do so. They wanted
 this to be a student event, not an adult/media event. Thanks to Amy Wood
 and her staff, and our administrators at all campuses for working behind
 the scenes with the Hall of Fame to make this happen.
- Our administrator PLC traveled to AMS this week to tour the Outdoor Learning Center. We had a great visit, saw AMS students working with elementary students, and got to witness the great interaction going on between our students from different grade levels. Thanks to AMS for making this happen and for the students and staff who were involved.
- Our GHS Bands had a sweepstakes week as we were rated Superior at the regional contest. Our band has quite a run of sweepstakes awards and always represent us very well at these contests. Congrats!
- Our softball team is in the playoffs after finishing 2nd place in district play. Congrats to Coach Jayjohn, her staff, and our players for their outstanding year and we look forward to the playoffs!
- Last night, we had our employee banquet where we recognized years of service and employees of the year. Thanks to Wes Jones and our HR department for putting on a great banquet. With their planning, we had an "Academy Awards night" with student entertainment, some good laughs,

and great food. It is always great to see employees who have been in GISD for many years being recognized, and to see employees chosen by their peers as truly outstanding. Congrats to all!

Legislative Update:

In a preliminary vote, the House approved Rep. Dan Huberty's bill to inject \$1.6 billion into public schools and simplify complicated funding formulas. Legislators must still take a final vote on the bill and the Senate and House will come together in a conference committee to come up with a compromise finance bill, as the Senate and House versions are very different. The House bill increases the basic allotment, addresses transportation issues, offers new weights for students' with dyslexia and provides hardship grants to districts affected by the ASATR (GISD is one of those districts affected). The bill passed 134-16. Representative Lang was one of 16 representatives to vote against this bill.

The Senate, approved SB 640 this week by a vote of 23-8. This bill would allow children who are home-schooled to participate in UIL activities at public schools. Essentially, a home school student could show up at GISD and decide they want to be in our band or play athletics or do other UIL activities, but otherwise not attend our schools. They would not have any attendance requirements, no-pass-no play would not affect them, but we would allow them to show up and pick the activities they would like to take part in. Groups associated with public schools are opposed to this measure for the reasons I just stated. I have said this many times; I have no problem with people who choose to home school their children or send them to private school. That is their choice and I fully support that choice. But, when they make that choice, they also make the choice to participate in private and home school activities. I don't believe you should be able to choose the parts of our school you want to be a part of, but stay home for the parts you don't like. Senator Birdwell was one of 23 Senators who supported this bill.

- Yesterday, I visited AES as a group of teachers from Burkburnett came for a second trip
 to look at how AES is implementing PBL. They saw projects in various stages, heard
 from students, teachers and administrators and were very excited to get their program
 going. It is always great to see our staff share ideas with other schools around the
 state. Thanks AES staff and students!
- I had my final meeting with my SSAC (student group) this week. We discussed future plans, college, prom, and a variety of other issues. What great kids we have in Granbury and I am always impressed and energized after I meet with them.
- A couple of district administrators visited GHS this week. This is what they reported: Upper Grand Hall-every class was actively engaged in lessons; students working collaboratively and participating in the discussion; Art Hall-students working on projects and teachers facilitating the lessons; Culinary-HEB meat market director demonstrating how to cut up a chicken; Auto Tech-showing self-made videos of poor mechanics, very funny and applicable; Dance-demonstrated their dance production for tonight's show; Aviation-plane under construction; Engineering-the recycling of trash using marbles; students designing trains and rooms; Lecture Hall-being used by English department; JROTC-testing on military protocol; Lunch was smooth and quiet with counselors answering student's questions. Thanks to GHS for taking care of business and keeping kids engaged!!
- Our boys golf team has qualified for the State Tournament! They had a tough tournament in Rockwall, but played hard and fought off some really tough competition to finish 2nd in Regionals. Congrats to Coach Ward and our players. We look forward to watching them compete at the next level of competition.
- I attended our softball playoff game last night at Weatherford College. Our girls played hard but came up a little short against a good (and very fast) Mansfield Lake Ridge team. Congrats to Coach Jayjohn and our players on a great season. They have come a

long way in a short amount of time, and I think we will see our girls make regular playoff appearances for the foreseeable future.

- Our **baseball team** had a good win Tuesday vs. Cleburne and are still in the **playoff hunt**. Tonight's game against Seguin and a possible play-in game will determine whether or not we advance.
- Speaking of baseball, I got this news from Weatherford College this week. It is always great to see our graduates are having success at the next level: Weatherford College's Landon Gray is the North Texas Junior College Athletic Conference Baseball Position Player of the Week for April 16-22. The freshman catcher from Granbury had a .571 batting average last week with three home runs, 11 RBI, five runs scored and five walks to lead the Coyotes to a 4-0 record during that period. Legislative Update:

I got this from **TRS this week**. Retirement season is here and you may have employees planning their next big move. TRS wants you to know that the **health plans currently available to retirees may be different** by the time your employees retire. The 85th Texas Legislature is **considering legislation that could make significant changes to TRS-Care, the retiree health program,** to sustain the program for current and future retirees. TRS is closely monitoring legislative activity, and if any legislation passes that affects TRS health plans, TRS will communicate information to participants about their health plan options.

The House heard a couple of bills this week that would **restrict Districts of Innovation**, especially regarding the **school calendar**. This bill was led by the **tourism industry** and they want to make every school in the state have **uniform start and end dates**. One bill had financial and academic accountability standards before a school could even apply to be a DOI. We **hope we will be grandfathered**, since we have already completed the DOI process and it is supposed to be good for 5 years. We will see if this bill moves any further in the process and how this may affect us.

Good morning, GISD. We continue to have something going on every night of the week. This is a fun time of year for student recognition, awards, banquets, etc. And, we are in the middle of the testing season... So, please continue to keep your students engaged in learning, keep close supervision and remember that when students are having fun, actively engaged, and learning, there are very few problems. If you take away those elements, students become bored and unengaged, and they WILL start finding things to do, and they are not always positive.

A few things this week:

- Last night I attended the Top 25 banquet. This is one of my favorite events; one where
 our top 25 seniors are recognized for being outstanding academic scholars. The thing
 that makes this event really special is that each of the students selects a person in their
 school career who has influenced them the most. It is so impressive seeing who they

You are part of **shaping the lives of the hundreds of students** you will work with over the course of a career. And, **you WILL have an impact** on them, one way or the other. **I hope that each of you strives** to have the type impact that those 25 staff members who were recognized last night has had on their students. **They are true life changers**.
- Attached to this email, are the paragraphs written by our students about the person
 they chose. I would urge you to take some time to read what students say about our
 staff and the truly life-changing impact they have had on them. These are really worth
 reading and as you do, you will see some common themes. They taught me life
 lessons, they took a personal interest in me, they picked me up when I was down, they

never gave up on me, they had high expectations, they made class fun, but expected us to learn, etc. You can take their comments, piece them together, and you will have the perfect educator. Please take the time to read the attachment.

- I stopped in at prom for a brief time last Saturday. All of you would have been impressed with our students, the supervision, the venue, and the great time our kids were having. Sometimes we hear negative things about our kids, mostly from people who have never been in our school or around our kids. I can tell you that I wish all of those naysayers could go in and watch our 600+ students as they enjoyed time with their friends, were dressed in formals, and had a great night. Everyone would have been proud of how this group represented GISD!
- Our Pirate baseball team will be in action tonight in the first round of the playoffs. Game 1 will be at home, tonight at 7:30 against Waxahachie. Tomorrow we will travel to Waxahachie for game 2 and 3 (if needed).
- Thanks to Atyka Ditto and our entire district for working with the GMS StuCo to send needed supplies, money, and putting together a blood drive for the people in Canton,
 TX. I am sure you will hear more about this and see more pictures related to this outstanding show of support for the Canton community.

<u>Legislative Update:</u> This week, the legislature made a lot of progress, especially in the **House** where they passed several bills of interest to us. HB 463 was approved that would make the Individual Graduation Committees (IGC) permanent. HB 22 revised the A-F system. Even though most educators do not believe in the system at all, if we are going to have a system that gives us a letter grade, we should at least have one that makes sense and can be measured. HB 22 moves us closer to that. HB 1776 removes the US History EOC and replaces it with the US Citizenship exam. HB 515 is a test reduction bill that we really like. It will reduce state testing to no more than is required by the Federal Government. HB 2442 cleans up the "minutes bill" from last session and clarifies some of the issues we found. Finally, HB 3976 is a bill addressing TRS Care. It does put some money into the TRS Care system to help with the shortfall, but TRS retirees are still likely to see an increase in premiums. All of these had generally positive support from the education community and while not perfect, they mostly do some good things. Now, the Senate gets to look at these bills and vote. We will see how that goes... Thus far, the House has been much more pro-education than the Senate. The analogy is that getting a bill actually passed is like watching sausage getting made...it isn't a pretty process. We will continue to hope that the Senate will support these bills and others that are good for kids and educators.

Good Morning GISD, I hope you are all enjoying the nice weather and are having a great week.

- I know this was another **testing week** for a lot of you. Thanks for your **great supervision and attention to detail** as we administer these tests.
- Nurse Appreciation Day was Wednesday of this week. I hope all of you had a chance to go by and tell your nurse thanks for all they do for our kids. If not, today would be a good day.
- I had lunch with our aviation mentors this week. These folks have given of their time this entire school year working with our students in the aviation lab. The finished product will be a fully functional RV 12 airplane! I am sure you will see more information on this project in the coming weeks and months.
- I attended **GHS Biology classes** this week as the students were learning about beekeeping and honey production from our very own **Brian Caruthers**. Brian has gotten into this hobby and is very knowledgeable about the topic, the types of bees, the honey-making process, etc. Our students had lots of questions and it was a great class.
- On Thursday, I ate lunch at "The Galley" as our culinary students have begun the process of opening a diner that we hope will expand into a full-fledged restaurant run by our students. The service was great, food was delicious and everyone really enjoyed the experience. Great job!

<u>Legislative Update:</u> This is a bit of a lengthy update this week, but for those of you following this, it gives a good illustration of how legislation works and how amendments can disrupt what otherwise was considered a good bill.

CSHB 21: School Finance (We support HB 21 without the amendment)
Public education advocates were relieved to see that public education funding reform still had a chance! A **big surprise was revealed** when Chairman Taylor explained his committee

substitute for HB 21. He listed a couple of changes, but it was the third change that woke up anyone who was dozing or otherwise distracted. He announced that the senate version of HB 21 would create an education savings account program (ESAs) for kids with disabilities, who were in public school the year before in either Special Ed or had a 504 plan. Each student would receive 90% of the state M&O, 5% would go back to the school district, and the last 5% would fund a dyslexia allotment.

The senate's voucher virus, that some had pronounced dead, found a possible host in the school finance bill that public education advocates had embraced in its original form. Knowing how desperate public schools are for a few more dollars, the senate figured maybe we could accept some vouchers if funding was dependent on it. A long line of people quickly formed in the hearing room as witnesses changed their position on the bill from "for" to "against." Prepared testimony in support of the house school finance fix quickly changed to condemnation of vouchers in any form. Public education advocates were consistent in their opposition to this new provision, however some senators who have strongly opposed vouchers, seemed to show a softening for special ed vouchers in response to the horror stories that have been shared since the revelation of TEA's 8.5% special ed cap. These senators asked for promises from Chairman Taylor that the program wouldn't grow and he said that he intended for it to stay focused. Of course, this is how vouchers have started in almost every voucher state and within a few years the programs always grow, whether or not they are successful for students.

SB 2052 (Larry Taylor): Districts of Innovation and School Start Date (Even though GISD will be grandfathered for 5 years, we do not like this bill as it limits local control)

Senator Taylor introduced SB 2052, which would change the law governing when school districts can begin instruction for students. The bill would move the date from "not before the fourth Monday in August" to "not before the third Monday in August." The other major change this bill would make is to state that a District of Innovation (DOI) cannot exempt itself from the uniform first day of instruction going forward. Existing DOIs would be grandfathered for the 5 years of their previously adopted DOI. However, DOIs created after the implementation of the bill (if passed) and renewals of DOIs would be subject to this rule. So, if you have a DOI that exempts your district from the uniform start date, you can keep that exemption until you need to renew. If you haven't already created a DOI and don't complete that process before this bill becomes law, then you will not be able to exempt your district from the uniform start date. The bill is still pending in committee, and we will let you know when and if it moves forward.

SB 7 (Bettencourt/ Ken King): **Inappropriate Student Teacher Relationships** (This is a bill we support, but some of the wording in the actual bill is vague, which is concerning) Earlier this week, SB 7, the bill **expanding and strengthening penalties on superintendents and principals** who don't report **allegations of inappropriate teacher-student relationships**,

passed unanimously on third reading in the Texas House of Representatives. This bill had already passed unanimously in the Texas Senate and will almost certainly be signed into law by the governor. The version of the bill passed into law expands reporting requirements and penalties to include principals (in addition to superintendents), private schools, and covers relationships between teachers and students in their own or any other district. A purposeful lack of reporting to SBEC would result in a state jail felony, and unintentional lack of reporting within 7 business days would result in a fine up to \$10,000. Several amendments were adopted into the final version of the bill including:

- a. Requiring the **school board to notify the parent** or guardian of a student with whom educator misconduct was alleged.
- b. Requiring a **pre-employment affidavit** for an applicant to work at an ISD, DOI, open-enrollment charter, ESC, or shared service arrangement disclosing whether the applicant has ever been charged with, adjudicated for, or been convicted of having an inappropriate relationship with a minor.
- c. **Disallowing the collection of a pension for a teacher convicted** of an improper relationship. An amendment to that amendment gives a judge the discretion to award the pension to the family of the convicted party.

We will start seeing bills actually go the Governor's desk in the coming weeks. That is when we will know for sure which of these bills actually becomes law.

I went out and had a nice discussion with he and his teacher, Mrs. Jackson, and we formulated a plan so that he could begin his bucket list if he did a few simple things. It is always fun to meet with our kids.
- While at Mambrino, I was able to step in and see the exciting final matches of our district chess championship that pits the 2nd and 3rd grade campus winners against each other. Chess is a great tool for our younger students to learn problem solving and critical thinking skills and it is fun to see them take the matches so seriously.
- I also made it out to Brawner to see their PBL on animal habitat, where students had created boards on a variety of animals that depicted their habitat, characteristics, food choices and other interesting facts.
- Finally, I was able to watch our **Pirate football** team in some morning drills as they are wrapping up spring training.
- Last night I attended the **senior awards program** as we awarded millions of dollars in scholarships and recognition for our soon-to-be graduates. It is always fun to hear the plans of our students and the hopes and dreams they have for themselves. I have no doubt that many of them will be very successful and you should all be proud to know that you played a part in their future.

Legislative Update:

Lt. Governor **Dan Patrick** held a press conference this week in response to a letter Speaker of the House Joe Straus sent to him regarding the two pieces of legislation the House needed to pass so they would not go into special session. The Lt. Governor specified that he had planned to "negotiate in private" but once the letter from the speaker to him was in the press, he decided to speak out. He **firmly disagreed with the speaker's** notion that the Legislature should pass the budget and sunset bill and call it a day. He stated that SB 310, the "must-pass" sunset bill of state agencies is in "the hands of the Senate" and **they must see action in the House.**

Specifically, the Lt. Governor stated that SB 2, which deals with the city and county taxes, and SB 6, better known as the "bathroom bill," must pass the House. The gauntlet was basically thrown down by the Lt. Governor and stated that although it is up to the governor to call and to decide which legislation to consider during a special, he was willing to go to special if those two bills are not passed. He then gave a quick summary of HB 21, the school finance bill, that differed from the bill voted out by the Senate Education Committee. He stated that the Senate is willing to delay the implementation of A-F until 2019 "if" the House concurs with the Senate version of HB 21, which includes facility funding for charter schools (currently not in the bill) and education savings accounts for special education students. He then reiterated that he will be willing to go to special session if SB 2 and SB 6 do not pass.

Per news reports, the **governor and the speaker have responded to this press conference**. Here are their responses:

Abbott spokesman John Wittman: "The Governor made clear yesterday that property tax reform and maintaining privacy in restrooms and locker rooms are legislative priorities that must be passed, and he believes both items can be achieved before the end of the regular session. The governor is grateful that the House has set the property tax bill to be heard on the floor tomorrow, and is making progress on privacy legislation. The governor will continue working with the House and Senate to conclude another successful legislative session."

Speaker Joe Strauss: Governor Patrick's threat to force a special session unless he gets everything his way is regrettable, and I hope that he reconsiders. The best way to end this session is to reach consensus on as many issues as we can. Nobody is going to get everything they want. But we can come together on many issues and end this session knowing that we have positively addressed priorities that matter to Texas." Twelve days and nine hours more until sine die.

Who says we don't have fun during session?

I can truly say it was one of the best ones we have had at Emma in a long time. He spent so many hours after school and on the weekends working to make sure the kids had a blast. It was so well organized and thought out. Thank you so much!

<u>From Mambrino:</u> Thank so much to Cary VanLoh for fixing my Chromebook. I appreciate all the trips out to Mambrino to try to figure out what was going on with it and all the time spent to solve the problem. I am truly thankful for a **technology department** committed to working hard for our students and staff.

<u>From a Parent:</u> My boys are finishing up their year at Acton Middle School. Good Morning GISD, I hope you are having a great week and I know a lot of your students are happy as this might be their last day of school, due to flex days.

- Regarding our flex days, please remember that these days are for extending the
 classroom, small group instruction, making up attendance and incompletes, and giving
 our students a good push for the summer and any re-takes they may have. This is our
 first time to do this, so we need to make sure these are meaningful and productive
 days.
- I am not going to report all our test scores in my weekly, as I know you will be getting detailed reports on all your scores. I do want to point out some great news from our middle schools. For those students who took high school courses in middle school, 100% of students at GMS and 99% of students at AMS passed the End of Course exam in Algebra I. For End of Course English, 97% at AMS and 90% at GMS passed the test. This represents about 200 students out of the 500 or so in the 8th grade class who passed a high school end of course exam. The bad news for us (which also shows how unfair our rating system is) is that these 200 exemplary students do not "count" as part of our 8th grade STAAR report. So, our 8th grade results will reflect only the remaining 300 students who took the STAAR test. The State should put an asterisk by these scores...
- Our boys golf team made another appearance at the 5A State Tournament and finished in 7th place overall. That is a great finish for a really young team. I think we may be a regular at this tournament for the next few year.
- I attended the AES Writer's Café this week, where the 5th graders had created themes in each classroom, and students from other grades came through, read their books and had a great experience with the "big kids."
- The choir started a new tradition this year by having an end of year banquet. It was well-planned, the kids had a good time, and everyone appreciated Ms. Fisher and Mr.
 Doss for their hard work this year.

• Our **GMS** 6th **graders** created an **ecosystem for their PBL**. They have an entire classroom set up, **from rainforests to the desert**, with different species of **animals**, **fish**, **and plants**. They did a good job and different classes from around the school came in for a tour.

Legislative update:

With just three days remaining until the 85th legislative session must adjourn sine die, Texas legislators are still slogging their way through bills that would **fund state government** for the next two years, **dictate bathroom use for transgender students**, **roll back municipal property tax increases**, **relax voter identification requirements** and **control the religious affiliation of foster parents**.

Legislators have already rejected more money for public schools and taxpayer-funded vouchers for Special Education students.

If the Legislature doesn't satisfactorily address the issues that Governor Greg Abbott and Lt. Governor Dan Patrick consider to be important before its mandatory adjournment at midnight next Monday, May 29, then a special session could begin as early as next Tuesday.

I will add that in my opinion, this session has been a real embarrassment, as the entire state budget, public education, and many, many bills that would have been good for Texans, have been hijacked by the Lt. Governor. He has controlled the Senate, and other than a very few members, they have followed lock-step in whatever he has told them to do.

As I have asked many times, and will reiterate today; will this finally be the session that will bring public educators to the polls to **vote for pro-public education candidates?** Only time will tell...

Legislative Update:

From the School Coalition: This quote sums up the 85th regular session of the Texas Legislature... "It's absurd that 'bathroom bills' have taken on greater urgency than fixing our school finance system." Speaker Joe Straus, R-San Antonio, made that observation, as the

85th legislative session was drawing to a close, telling Lieutenant Governor Dan Patrick, R-Houston, that the House would no longer negotiate on legislation that restricts transgender Texans' use of bathrooms.

After several days of sputtering, on-again, off-again attempts at negotiations, legislators finally threw-up their hands—and let die—the House bill that would have pumped an additional \$1.6 billion into Texas public schools, all because of the insistence of Lieutenant Governor Patrick that the legislation also include a student voucher provision. The original House Bill 21, filed by House Public Education Committee Chair Dan Huberty, R-Humble, would have infused an additional \$1.6 billion into the state's public schools, and overhauled various antiquated and inequitable school funding formulas. When the bill arrived across the Capitol rotunda, Senate Education Committee Chair Larry Taylor, F-Friendswood, reduced the school funding to just \$530 million—and at the insistence of Lieutenant Governor Patrick—added the deal-breaker: a student voucher scheme.

State Capitol observers generally agree that Lieutenant Governor Patrick allowed the school-funding bill to die in the Senate—by added the Special Ed voucher proposal—in retaliation for Speaker Straus and the Texas House opposing a transgender "bathroom bill."

It if funny how politics works, and it is a real shame that some good legislation that would have helped millions of public school students was put to death over a political stance and voucher scheme that would have affected less than 1% of students.

The team effort is very appreciated!

From Transportation: I have to share one of the coolest stories of this school year. One of our campuses has a student that has been blind since birth. He is has a true love for rap music. One day while waiting to go into school he was asking the bus driver about the other bus drivers. His driver said we have several different drivers but one in particular is Cowboy Roy. (The student) wanted to know why his name was Cowboy Roy and the other driver said "because he wears a cowboy hat every day." (The student) took it upon himself to make a VERY cute rap song about Cowboy Roy. The driver shared the story with Cowboy Roy. We

actually pulled the bus video and watched him sing his song about Cowboy Roy on the bus. If this wasn't enough, today Roy Alexander (Cowboy Roy) took one of his own personal hats and gave it to (the student). How much is that smile worth?? We are certainly proud of our Cowboy Roy!!

Final Thoughts:

The email above is a great example of the fact that every employee in GISD is important. There is no one person or position any more important than any other. Good Morning GISD!

First, thanks to a **great start to our school year!** We are off and running and things have gone very smoothly. This does not happen by itself. The special session is over and a severely watered down school bill was passed this week. Our legislature spent a whole lot of time in the regular and special sessions on what I call "nonsense bills" and not nearly enough time on bills that would truly have made a difference in the lives of Texans. Here is how the **Texas Association of Community Schools** described it:

"I am sad, disappointed, and above all, I am angry. Chairman (House Public Education Committee) Dan Huberty is disappointed, and the 5.4 million students in Texas public schools, their parents, the taxpayers who fund the schools, and the 700,000 Texans working in Texas public schools should be angry too. The Texas Senate shortchanged our kids again and we should be outraged all the way to the voting booth."

At convocation, I mentioned the group **Texans for Public Education**. Here is their website. https://www.texansforpubliceducation.com/ If you go down the home page about half way, there is a button that says "**Our Ratings.**" Below that, there is button that says "**House Ratings 2017.**" By clicking on this, you will find how each member of the House voted on key education bills. My understanding is that **Senate and State Board of Education ratings will come later.** This group is bipartisan, not affiliated with any political party and you can see that there are R's and D's who are labeled as friendly and unfriendly to public education, based on how they vote in Austin. Like I said at convocation, it **does not matter what our elected officials say, what they post, or how many pictures with kids they take. What matters is how they vote on bills that affect public education.** I would encourage you to connect with this group, follow them on Facebook, send the group's information to everyone you know, etc. But, please do not post messages or send emails using your GISD accounts. You can certainly do this on your private email or social media pages as much as you want after school hours. In fact, it is encouraged!

The final product was a 600-pound rocket that they launched from the White Sands Missile Range in New Mexico. It traveled three times the speed of sound and

higher than commercial airplanes fly. Eric stayed in school, went to college, got an internship at NASA, and after his sophomore year was offered a job at NASA when he graduates. If that isn't a public school success story, I don't know what is.

Good Morning GISD. I hope you are all wrapping up the end of our first six weeks with all your students doing well. A few items this week:

- The GHS drumline competed in the HEB Drumline Contest this past Saturday with some of the best drumlines in the DFW area. The PDL finished in 3rd place and earned the 'Best Bass Drum Line' award in their category! They represented GHS & GISD in a very positive way all day long. Congrats to our percussion team.
- Melinda Rose, Spanish teacher at GHS, was selected as the 95.9 Ranch Teacher of the Week. She was surprised in class with a plaque as well as numerous gift cards and was announced on The Ranch radio this week. Congrats Melinda! - Our F1 team is now in Malaysia. I am so proud of these kids and proud that they are literally able to travel the world through a program at our school. Really cool!
- Please think about alternatives before you print or make copies. Our printing, paper, and printer cartridge costs are getting excessive. Look for alternate ways to test, have students take notes, and otherwise do classwork without having to print everything. We have lots of options available to you, and if you need ideas, please contact our technology or curriculum department for help or ideas on how to get what you need from your students without the time, cost, and hassle of printing everything. I am not saying some printing and copying is not necessary, but I do know there are many other ways to get this done that are more efficient, don't kill trees, and doesn't cost as much.
- We seem to be having more reports of **pest problems** (insects, rodents, spiders, etc.) in our schools; more so than in years past. Please know that we are working with our **pest control company** and our local **IPM coordinator** to address this issue. There are

state laws that preclude us from just spraying everything every 3-4 months like they used to. I won't go into all the details, but basically the law only allows us to spray an area if there is a problem that can't be handled any other way. Pests come in our buildings for food, water, and shelter. Without them, they won't stay anywhere long. We need to make sure that food is not left out on tables, in desk drawers, break rooms, etc. without being in a sealed container. If you are seeing a problem, make sure to report it to your campus contact and they will turn in a work order. If a few days go by and you continue to see multiple pests, turn it in again. And, make sure you check your work areas, drawers, etc. to insure there is no food source that is causing the problem. We can make this situation much better, but we will need your help. Thanks.
