Course Description

This course provides an interface between human sexuality, reproductive development, and gender roles across the lifespan; theoretical and research literature promotes understanding of hormonal influences, learning processes, cultural differences, sexual response, love, and attraction.

Course Learning Outcomes

- Identify how culture influences sexuality and sexual behavior.
- Explain biological processes related to sex and reproduction across the lifespan.
- Identify sex-related health problems and strategies for reducing or treating those problems.
- Discuss the wide variety of sexual behaviors, feelings, attitudes, and identities.
- Describe sexual violence, "sex for sale", and some of their causes.

Course Components

Lectures

This class is designated as an in-person class thus both lectures and exams will be administered in the designated classroom. There are no zoom options. Class notes are not provided.

Assignments

Quizzes (40 points total; administered on Canvas; due on most Sundays by 11:59 pm): There will be a total of 8 quizzes. Each quiz will have 10 questions and be worth a maximum of 5 points. The final point total for quizzes will be your 8 quiz grades x 10 points = 40 points possible. The quizzes are open-book and open notes (but not open-student; in other words, do not share any information about the quiz with other students). You will have 20 minutes to complete each one. Material on the quizzes will be primarily from the textbook but some items may come from lecture. These quizzes are typically due on Sundays and have strict deadlines. See below for an opportunity to replace one quiz grade including a missed quiz. Canvas, internet, time management, data entry and other last-minute problems are not valid excuses for missing quiz deadlines.

Sex In the World Around Us Contributions (SIWAU-CON) (each worth 10 points; 3 required for a total of 30 points) - These contributions will be submitted in Canvas on a Discussion Board on specified Wednesdays (see calendar/lecture schedule for due dates). There are 2 required during the semester. More detailed instructions for these assignments can be found on Canvas.

Project: Two Options

- 1) *Option 1: Take-Action Assignment* (consists of two parts) This project allows you to pick a topic relevant to this course and "do" something with the information.
 - a) Part 1: Take-Action Outline (10 points) See Canvas for detailed instructions
 - b) Part 2: Final Take Action Project (40 points) See Canvas for detailed instructions
- 2) Option 2: Sexual Self-Analysis (consists of two parts) This project allows you to think about various aspects of your sexuality and then write about it.
 - a) Part 1: Sexual Self-Analysis Outline (10 points) See Canvas for detailed instructions
 - b) Part 2: Sexual Self-Analysis Final Reflection (40 points) See Canvas for detailed instructions

Grade Replacement Assignment - Course Reflection (5 or 10 points) - April 16th by 11:59 pm (can replace one quiz - 5 points or SIWAU grade - 10 points - including a missed quiz/SIWAU) - This assignment encourages you to think about what you have learned in the course so far and reflect on the impact of the information for you personally. Look on Canvas for more specific instructions about the assignment. You can use the grade on this assignment to replace a low or missed quiz grade or a low or missed SIWAU assignment (Quiz #8 cannot be replaced)

Exams (100 x 4 = 400 points total)

There will be four **non-cumulative** exams that will be administered in the classroom. Each exam will be worth 100 points and will consist of 50 multiple-choice items (worth 2 points each). Students will be given 50 minutes to complete the exam.

If an exam is missed for any reason, the student must contact me as soon as possible using the email address: pamedens@tamu.edu. If a student has an authorized University excuse *and* contacts me within 48 hours of the missed exam, they will be allowed to take a make-up exam without penalty. If an exam is missed due to illness, an excuse from the Health Center or a Physician must be provided. If a make-up is missed due to a

reason that does not qualify as an University excuse (e.g., oversleeping), a make-up exam can be taken but there will be a 25% penalty as long as the student contacts me within 48 hours after the exam has been administered. If a student does not contact me within 48 hours, however, the maximum score that can be achieved is 50% of the make-up exam score even with an approved university excuse. Students contacting me more than 3 days after the scheduled exam will NOT be allowed to take a make-up exam and will get a zero on that exam. Make-up exams may not be the same as those given on the actual test date and may include both short-answer and multiple-choice questions. It is the student's responsibility to verify that an email sent to contact the professor about a missed exam is received.
