Lamar University be authorized to offer a Doctor of Nursing Practice degree, housed in the College of Nursing and Health Professions, with an implementation of Summer of 2027, upon final approval by the TSUS Board of Regents and the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

Explanation

The Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) is a terminal practice-focused degree designed to equip experienced professionals, executives, and aspiring scholars with advanced knowledge and applied research skills in nursing practice. Graduates will be prepared to transform clinical practice, improve healthcare quality and outcomes, optimize health systems, translate evidence into practice, and lead interprofessional teams in both practice and educational settings.

Texas, particularly Southeast Texas, continues to face growing healthcare demands driven by population growth, expanding rural and urban care needs, and an increasingly complex clinical environment. Developing a DNP program in this region directly responds to the state's urgent need for more advanced nurses and healthcare leaders who can deliver high-quality, evidence-based care across settings. By preparing nurses at the highest level of practice, this program will strengthen the local workforce, expand access to essential services, and equip clinicians and leaders to address health disparities, improve system performance, and support the long-term health and economic vitality of Southeast Texas and beyond.

The DNP at Lamar University is a structured doctorate program divided into two specialized tracks:

- Nursing Education – This track equips nurse educators with the skills to design, deliver, and evaluate high-quality nursing education that strengthens the future workforce. The program prepares expert nurse educators who elevate teaching, strengthen the nursing workforce, and advance healthcare quality through evidence-based educational practices.
- Executive Leadership – This track prepares nurse leaders to drive organizational improvement, influence policy, and lead complex health systems through evidence-based, strategic decision-making. The program develops visionary nurse leaders who drive system-level improvements, strengthen healthcare operations, and elevate patient outcomes.

The DNP program is structured as a two or three-year cohort model integrating advanced coursework, applied clinical practice, and a comprehensive doctoral project grounded in academic–practice partnership. Designed to bridge theory and real-world impact, the program emphasizes the practical and strategic application of research, empowering graduates to drive innovation, influence practice, and make meaningful contributions to both academic and healthcare industry advancements.

Nursing Education Track: Two-year online format with in-person practicum hours, 41 credit hours (1,000 practicum hours)

Executive Leadership Track: Two-year online format with in-person practicum hours, 41 credit hours (1,000 practicum hours)

Courses will be offered in online and in-person formats, combining on-campus immersion experiences with online coursework to support working professionals while maintaining the highest standards of academic rigor and clinical preparation. A detailed curriculum outline, including course listings and proposed schedules for each track, is provided below.

Lamar University's DNP program will be supported by a highly qualified faculty team with expertise in advanced clinical practice, nursing education, healthcare leadership, evidence-based practice, quality improvement, and health systems science. Faculty members and clinical experts will bring extensive industry experience, professional certifications, and scholarly achievement, creating an environment grounded in academic excellence and real-world application.

The DNP program will align with Lamar University's expanding healthcare partnerships across Southeast Texas, providing students with access to clinical sites, simulation resources, interprofessional collaboration, and opportunities to engage with healthcare leaders. The College of Nursing and Health Professions maintains a long-term strategic goal of strengthening its role as a regional hub for advanced nursing education and innovation in practice, further solidifying its commitment to improving health outcomes and workforce capacity.

SHSU: Degree Program Addition — Bachelor of Arts in World Languages and Cultures

Upon motion of Regent _____, seconded by Regent _____, it was ordered that:

Sam Houston State University be authorized to offer a Bachelor of Arts in World Languages and Cultures, housed in the Department of World Languages and Cultures, within the College of Humanities and Social Sciences with an implementation date of September 1, 2026, upon final approval by the TSUS Board of Regents and the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

Explanation

The proposed 120-semester credit hour Bachelor of Arts in World Languages and Cultures, with in-person, hybrid, and 100% online modality options, will offer three distinct concentrations, American Sign Language, French, and Spanish, to prepare students to use and evaluate languages other than English in academic, professional, and community settings. Students will build advanced proficiency in their chosen language concentration [i.e., Deaf Studies and Sign Language (DSSL), French, or Spanish] while also completing department-wide courses in language learning, linguistics and culture, and professional applications. Graduates will gain strong analytical and professional skills for careers in education, healthcare, legal fields, business, and other areas where multilingual abilities are required to meet local and global workforce demands.

Between 2019 and 2023, overall enrollment across all qualifying institutions remained steady, averaging 252 enrolled students (all classifications) each fall semester, indicating longevity in student demand for competing programs in the state. In addition, in the state of Texas, baccalaureate programs under the CIP Code 16.0101 (Foreign Languages and Literatures) experienced a substantial increase (987.5%) between 2012 to 2023, with a 2% increase between 2019 and 2023, reflecting a growing completion landscape.

Furthermore, in Texas, there are 224,710 jobs (2024) related to the proposed Bachelor of Arts in World Languages and Cultures, exceeding the national average by 5%, with a projected ten-year growth rate of 14.9%, prevailing the national average (9.4%). Among these occupations, Sales Manager leads with 38,228 jobs, while Medical and Health Service Manager occupations are forecasted to experience the most growth (31.19%) over the next decade (2024-2034). In addition, between January 2024 and January 2025, an approximate 4% increase (12,775 to 13,232) in job postings was noted compared to an almost 3% increase (17,764 to 18,259) in hires, indicating a growing job market for the target occupations related to multi/bilingual skills.

Upon completion of the proposed Bachelor of Arts in World Languages and Cultures, students will be able to:

- Demonstrate comprehension of signed, spoken, and/or written language(s) other than English in personal and professional contexts;
- Produce effective signed, spoken, and written language to communicate with users and learners of language(s) other than English in personal and professional contexts;
- Analyze cultural practices, perspectives, and products to enhance language proficiency and professional cross-cultural communication skills;
- Evaluate multilingual applications of human and machine language in practical contexts;

- Create informed solutions to practical communication challenges in professional multilingual environments (e.g., AI development and its applications, quality healthcare and legal services, language instruction).

There were no exceptions noted. The University reported athletic revenues and expenditures of \$23,970,399 and \$23,896,128 respectively, for a net excess of revenues totaling \$74,271. This represents an increase of the same amount over FY 2024, when revenues and expenditures netted to zero. Revenues consisted primarily of (approximate amounts): Student Fees (\$5.4M), Direct and Indirect Institutional Support (\$14.3M), Guarantees (\$629K), Contributions (\$1.2M), Conference Distributions (\$1.2M), and Royalties/Licensing/Advertisements/Sponsorships (\$550K). Ticket sales across all sports totaled \$391K. Revenues increased over the prior year by \$135K (primarily in Conference Distributions, which were partially offset by decreases in Indirect Institutional Support and Contributions). Expenditures consisted primarily of (approximate amounts): Athletic Student Aid (\$7.4M), Coaching and Staff Salaries/Benefits/Bonuses/Severance Payments (\$7.5M), Team Travel (\$1.7M), Sports Equipment/Uniforms/Supplies (\$1.5M), Debt Service/Leases/Rental Fees (\$1.6M), Direct Overhead/Administrative Expenses (\$1.2M), Medical Expenses & Medical Insurance (\$453K), and Student Meals (\$439K). <p>Annual Financial Report and Auditor’s Opinion on the SHSU Charter School, February 2026</p>	<p>This report outlines the results of an independent audit, performed by Carr, Riggs & Ingram, L.L.C., of SHSU’s Charter School financial statements for fiscal year 2025.</p> <p>As noted on Page 14 of the report (Adobe Reader), revenues and expenditures totaled \$4,112,828 and \$4,176,427, respectively, for a deficit of \$63,599. This was due primarily to a loss in state funding. The charter School reported a positive net fund balance of \$3,016,009. Although enrollment decreased from the prior year (429 to 382), this is the 6th year in a row that the Charter School has reported a positive fund balance.</p> <p>No significant deficiencies in internal controls were noted, and no instances of non-compliance material to the financial statements were disclosed during the audit.</p>		
<p>SHSU/USDA Cooperative Agreement Administrative and Financial Review, February 2026</p>	<p>This agreement (Award #AP22PPQFO000C401), totaling \$43,725 from June 1, 2022, through December 31, 2023, involved conducting a citrus greening educational program in Texas. The objectives of the review were to determine whether SHSU used the federal funds only as indicated in the Agreement’s approved budget, work, and financial plans and in accordance with applicable laws and federal regulations. The USDA’s Financial Management Division, Review and Analysis Branch (RAB) reviewed SHSU’s policies, procedures, and source documents for selected transactions to determine if the expenses SHSU charged to the Agreement appeared to be properly documented, allowable, reasonable, and allocable.</p> <p>There were no findings resulting from this review. Overall, RAB found SHSU followed the terms of the Agreement and documented expenses as indicated in the approved work and financial plans.</p>

The report was provided in an informational context and did not request or require any response from TXST; it was also the first notification TXST received regarding identified audit issues.</p> <p>The audit determined that 18 agencies and institutions misused temporary TINs in 932 instances, including 15 instances attributed to TXST. TXST determined that three of these were errors made by another institution and reported this to the Comptroller after the report was issued, since TXST was not made aware of any audit issues prior to the report’s distribution. The remaining 12 instances resulted from administrative processing errors, including payments made using temporary TINs for which the required Payee Change Request (PCR) forms were not submitted once permanent social security numbers were obtained. SHSU: Technical/CTE Dual Credit Designated Tuition Rates

Sam Houston State University be authorized to charge a designated tuition rate of \$50.00 per semester credit hour for technical/CTE (WECM) courses that are taught by a SHSU instructor and a tuition rate of \$0.00 per semester credit hour for technical/CTE (WECM) courses that are taught by a non-SHSU instructor at a facility not owned by SHSU.

Explanation

SHSU aims to utilize dual credit classes as both an intentional recruiting tool in our region and as community engagement. In order to do this, we must be comparably priced in the dual credit market.

The creation of a partnership with local high schools leverages the strong brand of SHSU to create name recognition and a potential recruitment pipeline.

The Board of Regents has previously approved SHSU to charge a rate of \$50.00 for academic (ACGM) courses and waived the statutory tuition rate of \$50.00 per semester credit hour. SHSU would waive mandatory fees as these students would not have access to many of these services.

TSUS: Senate Bill 52 Authorization Allocation

The proposed reallocation to the project authorizations incorporated in Senate Bill 52 87th (3rd) Legislature be adopted.

Explanation

The 87th (3rd) Legislature passed, and the Governor signed Senate Bill 52 relating to issuance of revenue bonds to fund capital projects at institutions of higher education, providing ~\$423 million to TSUS Components.

The bill also provides authority to the respective Board of Regents to 1) transfer funds among component institutions and 2) finance alternate projects. Financing alternate projects requires notification to the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board and if the alternate project is excess of \$25 million, the request is subject to approval by the Legislative Budget Board and the Office of the Governor.

The Texas State University System *Policies and Procedures Manual for Planning and Construction*, promulgated pursuant to The Texas State University System *Rules and Regulations*, provides that each member institution must develop a ten-year Comprehensive Campus Master Plan for approval by the Board of Regents.

Sul Ross State University (SRSU) competitively selected and engaged the firm Freese and Nichols, Inc., of Houston, Texas, to undertake the preparation of its 2021-2031 Campus Master Plan, approved by the Board of Regents in August 2021. At the February 2024 meeting, the Board of Regents approved a 2024 Sul Ross Master Plan for Eagle Pass based on a 100-acre land donation then under consideration. Since that time, SRSU acquired a 43.38-acre parcel of land for its Eagle Pass campus. This master plan provides a vision of how this 43.38-acre parcel can evolve into a comprehensive four-year university.

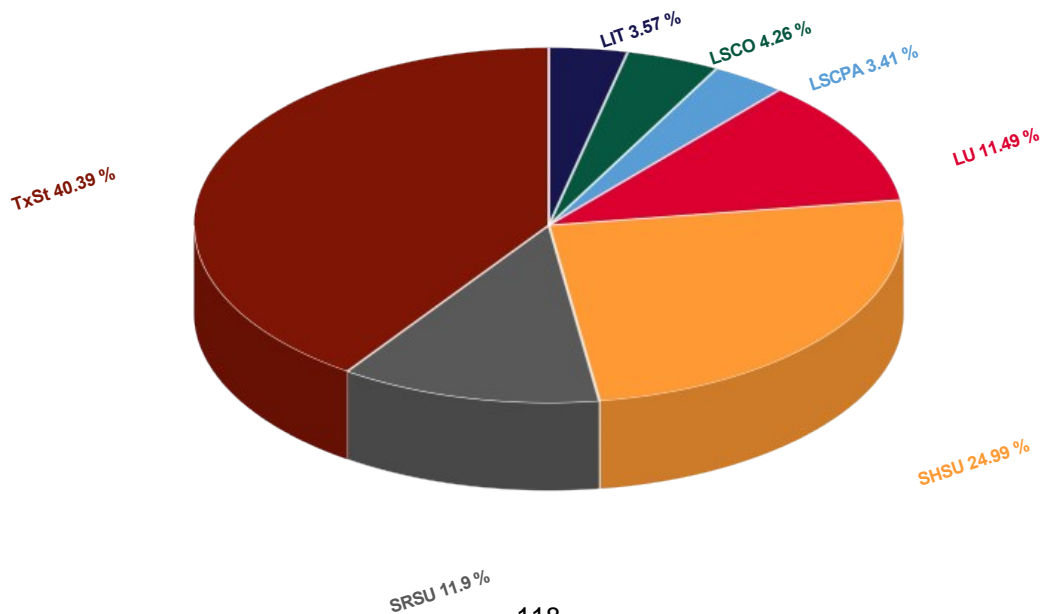

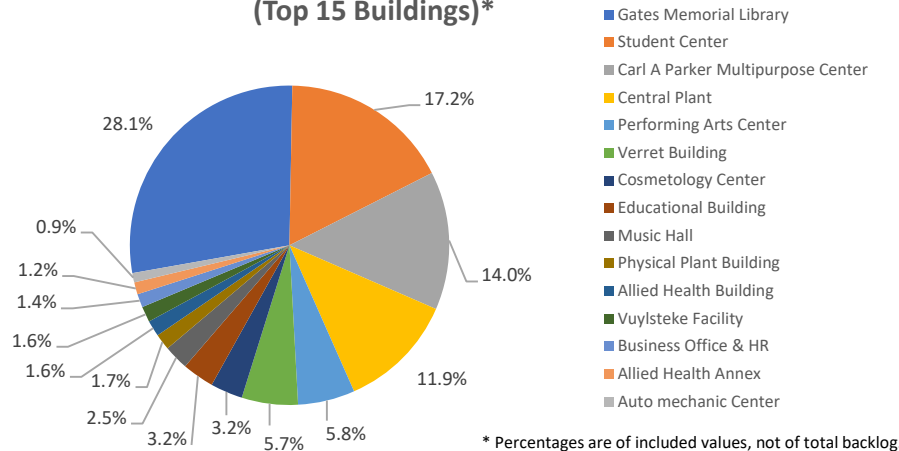


Backlog by Level 1



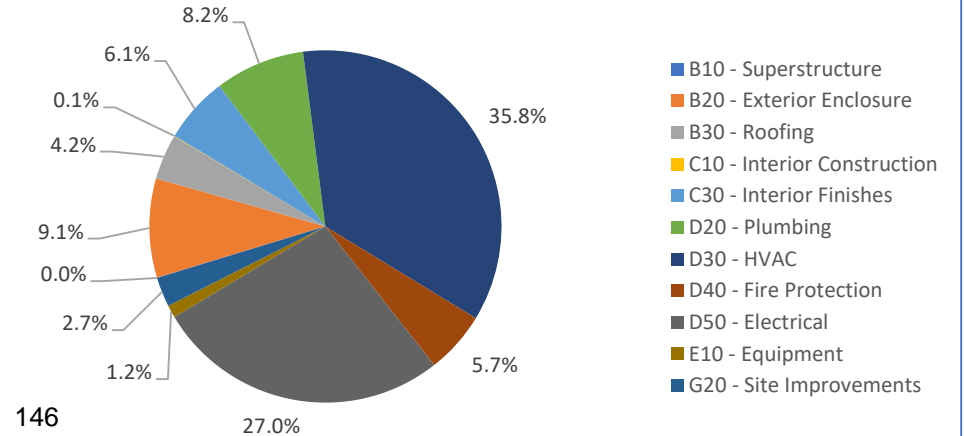

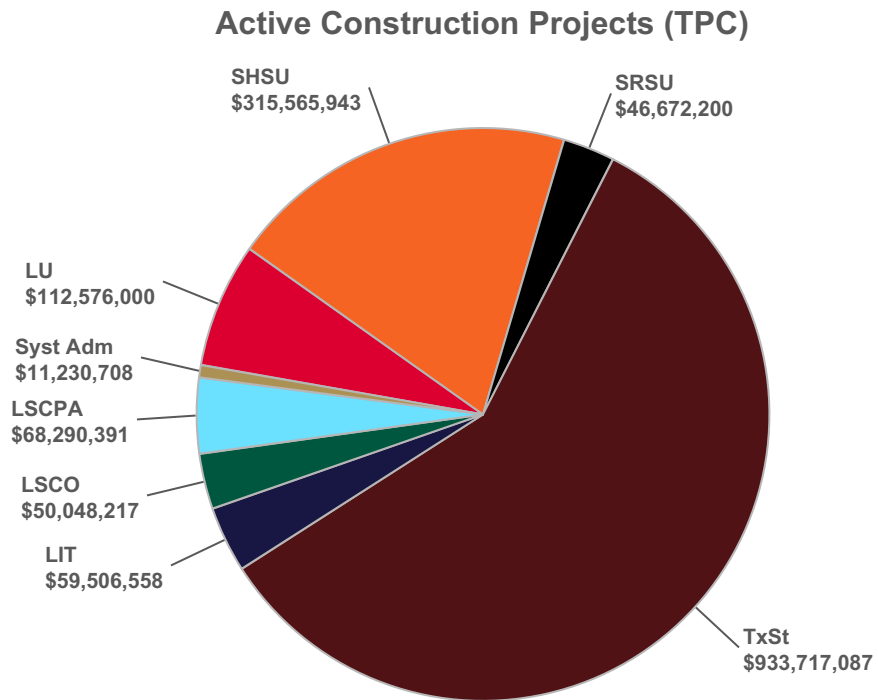

The Office of the Vice Chancellor and Chief Financial Officer shall maintain a Policies and Procedures Manual for Planning and Construction to govern the administration of the system-wide planning, design, and construction program. These policies and procedures require compliance with all applicable Federal and State laws and regulations and shall list all the current building codes that designs will be required to follow. The Board may direct changes to the Texas State University System's published policies and procedures at its discretion.

- 6.1 Insurance Coverage. The Texas State University System is authorized to purchase insurance policies ~~of insurance~~ for the System and its Components as provided by this *Subparagraph* or for other purposes that may be specifically authorized by statute.
- 6.11 Blanket Fidelity Bonds. Blanket fidelity bonds shall be required to cover all employees of the Components under the governance of the Board. The System's Vice Chancellor and Chief Financial Officer is responsible for coordinating acquisition of the blanket fidelity bonds.
- 6.12 Director's and Officer's Liability Insurance. Director's and officer's liability insurance shall be required to cover all regents, directors and officers of the System and its Components. The System's Vice Chancellor and Chief Financial Officer is responsible for coordinating acquisition of the Director's and Officer's coverage.
- 6.13 Intercollegiate Athletic Activities. The Components are authorized to purchase policies of insurance providing for the medical care, treatment, and services for injuries sustained by students while participating in or during supervised practices for intercollegiate athletic activities and to pay the premiums for such insurance out of the Component's auxiliary funds.
- 6.14 Automobile Liability and Physical Damage. The Components are authorized to purchase liability insurance to insure their administrative officers and other employees from liability arising from the use, operation, and maintenance of automobiles, trucks, tractors, power equipment, aircraft and motor boats or watercraft that are or may be used in the operation of the Component. The System's Vice Chancellor and Chief Financial Officer is responsible for coordinating acquisition of this coverage.
- 6.15 Property, Equipment Breakdown and Terrorism Insurance. The Components are authorized to purchase insurance for equipment, buildings, and facilities, as allowed by statute. The System's Vice Chancellor and Chief Financial Officer is responsible for coordinating acquisition of this coverage.
- 6.2 Debt Issuance Services
- 6.21 Bond Counsel. The Board shall employ bond counsel to advise and represent it in all matters pertaining to the issuance or proposed issuance of

~~bonds debt~~ of any type, the pledge of institutional credit, the assumption of deferred fiscal obligations, or the encumbrance of facilities of any Component under the governance of the Board. ~~Bond counsel shall be employed by the Board upon such terms and conditions and under such fee arrangement as the appointing order of the Board shall designate.~~

6.22 Financial Advisor. The Board shall employ a financial advisor to provide financial advice and represent the Board in concert with bond counsel in all matters pertaining to the issuance or proposed issuance of ~~bonds debt~~ of any type, the pledge of institutional credit, the assumption of deferred fiscal obligations, and the encumbrance of facilities of any Components under the governance of the Board. ~~The financial advisor shall be employed by the Board upon such terms and conditions and under such fee arrangement as the appointing order of the Board shall designate.~~

6.3 Institutional Funds. All institutional funds not required to be deposited in the State Treasury must by law be deposited in official depository banks for safekeeping or invested in accordance with the current Depository Funds Policy ~~and Investment Policy for Operating Funds and Endowment as adopted~~ Funds adopted by the Board of Regents.

Depository agreements with official depository banks shall be negotiated, as necessary, with those banks approved by the Board and in accordance with the then current policies of the Board.

6.31 Depository banks selected shall furnish adequate securities to assure safety of these funds. Institutional funds shall be deposited in the depository banks as soon as possible, but in no event later than seven days from the date of collection. Demand deposits and time deposits will be maintained in accordance with the current policies of the Board.

6.32 The Board and the Component Presidents may not, by law, borrow money from any person, firm, or corporation to be repaid from institutional funds except as specifically authorized by the Legislature.

All checks and Automated Clearing House (ACH) payments in the amount of \$35100,000 or greater shall be reviewed by two fiscal officers prior to payment, and over shall have the original signature of two fiscal officers. Payments in the amount of \$35,000 and over made by Automated Clearing House (“ACH”) shall have the original signature of two fiscal officers on the voucher documentation supporting the payment.~~
- ~~6.61—Banks with an Automated Payment Fraud Prevention Process.—If the Component’s local bank provides an automated payment fraud prevention process (e.g., positive payee) for payments, the Component may use the electronic signature of one of its fiscal officers for processing checks. - 6.71 Annual Operating Budget ~~and Budget Summary~~. ~~In accordance with Texas Education Code 51.0051, t~~The President of each Component shall prepare and submit annually to the Board at its ~~May or~~ August meeting, ~~as specified each year by the Board,~~ a proposed budget for the operation of the Component for the next fiscal period. ~~Copies of all proposed operating budgets shall be available to all members of the Board and the Chancellor at least eight calendar days in advance of such Board meeting. A budget summary is to be prepared and submitted in writing at least eight calendar days in advance of such Board meeting. The proposed operating budget and budget summary shall be in the form and detail recommended by the Chancellor with the approval of the Board, with all income estimated and itemized by fund, project, or department. - 6.72 Annual Financial Report. The Board of Regents has determined that the expenditure of institutional funds that are not otherwise restricted for the purchase of food, refreshments, and achievement awards assists the Components in the System in carrying out their educational functions, promotes education in the State of Texas, and provides an important public purpose. Accordingly, the Board authorizes each Component to use such funds for the purchase of food, refreshments, and achievement awards in accordance with the following guidelines. The President of each Component is delegated the authority to determine if specific expenditures for the purchase of food, refreshments, and achievement awards, using institutional funds, fall within the following objective guidelines established by the Board, and the Component President is authorized to implement this policy through appropriate directives and delegation.~~

6.824 In accordance with the General Appropriations Act, no funds under the control of intercollegiate athletics may be used to purchase alcoholic beverages.

~~6.9~~ Facsimile Documents. Facsimiles (fax copies) of various authorizations, requests, invoices, and so forth are acceptable as documentation for financial transactions. Original documentation must be retained by the originating party and remain available for inspection/audit.

~~6.(10)~~ Acceptance of Small Gifts. The Board welcomes contributions, both large and small, in aid of the various missions of the Component (see Chapter III, Subparagraph 1.(12)).

6.(11)9 Permanent and Quasi Endowments. The Board encourages creation of permanent endowments at System Components and authorizes each President to set the monetary levels required to establish such endowments. The establishment, abolishment and change to the corpus of a quasi-endowment is subject to Board approval.

6.(120) Travel Guidelines.

6.(120)1 Each System Component and System Administration shall develop travel policies and procedures governing employee travel in conformity with applicable federal and state laws.

~~In State Travel. The Component Presidents, or their respective designees, are authorized to approve the in state travel for personnel within their Components.~~

~~6.(12)2 Out-of-State Travel. The Component Presidents, or their respective designees, are authorized to approve out of state travel for personnel within their Components, provided the travel request is sought and approved by the President or the President's designee in advance of the travel.~~

6.(120)32 Out-of-Country Travel and Reimbursements. All out-of-country, official System or Component travel and reimbursements (excluding trips to Mexico, Canada, and U.S. territories) requires advance approval by: the Component President, or his or her their designee, for employees of each Component; the Chancellor, or their designee, for employees of System Administration; the Chancellor, or their designee, for Component Presidents; and the Board Chair for out-of-country travel and reimbursements require pre-approval by the Chancellor; and the Chancellor's out-of-country travel and reimbursements require pre-approval by the Board chair. Travel by and reimbursements for Regents and system office employees requires advance approval by the Chancellor, or his or her their designee. Out-of-country travel is defined as travel outside of the borders of the United States, excluding travel to Mexico, Canada, and United States territories.

Such monetary gifts shall be placed into a general Component development/enrichment fund to be used in the same manner as other gifts to the Component. Arrangements for the acceptance of product rebates or other forms of consideration must be approved by the appropriate Component Vice President or the President. Excluded from these procedures are the traditional complimentary books or materials used to evaluate textbook adoption decisions, and calendars, pens, coffee cups or other materials bearing the name or logo of the vendor which are intended as advertising.~~
- 6.(15) Indirect Cost Recovery. All grant proceeds shall be used to support and encourage research and grants (sponsored programs). Eligible uses include:

The only organizations that may utilize such number(s) are those that derive their existence and their funding solely from the Component. Examples include, but are not limited to, residence hall associations and student governments. To qualify for use of the tax number(s), the student or other organization's expenditures must be made from Component accounts and must have a business purpose related to the mission of the Component.

6.(173) Electronic Transactions. The Components of The Texas State University System are authorized to process business transactions through various electronic means. This includes, but is not limited to, direct deposit of wage and salary payments, incoming and out-going wire transfers, ACH, credit/debit cards, and in-house processing. All electronic transactions must incorporate adequate security precautions and ~~written~~ approvals so as to protect the financial integrity of each Component. ~~Signatory authority and documentation is to be consistent with that required for non-electronic transactions.~~

6.(184) Investment Policy. The Components of The Texas State University System may invest their funds in accordance with the Board approved *Investment Policy for Operating Funds and Endowment Funds*, which is hereby incorporated into these *Rules and Regulations*.

- (1) The authority to sign Corporate Resolutions on behalf of The Texas State University System and its Components, confirming the person or persons authorized to approve investment transactions is delegated to the Vice Chancellor and Chief Financial Officer. Requests to the Vice Chancellor and Chief Financial Officer to authorize Component investment officers to approve investment transactions shall be made by letter from the Component's President, in which the names of all persons being authorized to conduct such business for the Component are specified.

~~6.(19) Wireless Communication Services and Equipment. — Each Component shall establish policies regulating employee availability, acquisition, and use of wireless communication services and equipment for official business. A Component:~~

- ~~(1) — May not enter into any such agreement for the sole and personal benefit of any employee;~~
- ~~(2) — May support an employee's wireless communications service costs for conducting official business by providing a monthly payroll allowance or reimbursing the employee's business-related costs.~~
- ~~(3) — Must discontinue support if: a) the employee discontinues his or her service plan; b) support exceeds the employee's costs for the plan; or, c) the~~

~~employee's job duties no longer require wireless communication services;

6.(2015) Identity Theft Prevention Program (“Red Flags Rule”). Considering the size and complexity of its operations and accounting systems, as well as the nature and scope of its activities, each President shall assure that his or her Component develops an Identity Theft Prevention Program (“Program”) that includes reasonable policies and procedures to detect, identify, mitigate, and prevent identity theft. The Program shall conform to the Federal Trade Commission’s “Red Flags Rule” found in 16 CFR §681.

6.(2015)1 Program Administrator. Each Component shall name a Program Administrator to be the primary administrator empowered to manage and execute all aspects of the Program, including the engagement of other institutional departments and personnel as necessary to detect, identify, mitigate, and prevent identity theft.

6.(2015)2 Scope of Regulation. Each Component program shall minimally address the following areas, to the extent applicable to Component operations:

- (1) Issuance of student identification cards that are part of a national debt card (such as Visa or MasterCard);
- (2) Use of consumer reports or background checks;
- (3) Handling of consumer accounts that involve multiple payments, including but not necessarily limited to the following:
 - (a) The federal Perkins Loan Program;
 - (b) The federal Family Education Loan Program;
 - (c) Institutional loan programs for students, faculty, or staff; or,
 - (d) Institutional tuition (or fee) installment payment plans (*Education Code, section 54.007*).

Explanation

The proposed changes focus on modernizing the Financial Affairs section of Chapter III to clarify and simplify language, reduce ambiguity, and to align with evolved business operations and practices, the current governance structure and removes superfluous references and statements.

Additionally, the proposed changes include:

- Amends 6.6 by increasing the threshold for dual signatures from \$35,000 to \$100,000. This reflects an inflationary increase to the dollar threshold.
- Amends new 6.(11)3 by increasing the threshold for advanced approval for the sale of property and equipment less than 5 years old with a book value from \$10,000 to \$100,000 and tasks the System Office with providing that approval. This reflects an inflation increase to the dollar threshold and aligns approval with the current governance structure.

- 10.2(11) Contracts using a Group Purchasing Organization (GPO) as the procurement justification and no individual item exceeds \$2 million.
- 10.2(12) Interagency agreements with, or through, the Texas Connection Consortium (TCC) and no individual item exceeds \$2 million.
- 10.3 Record Retention for Contracts. The original or a copy of an executed contract shall be retained pursuant to the Texas State Records Retention Schedule by the signatory Component as a record of the Board.
- 10.4 Endorsement Format of Agreements. All contracts, purchases, and agreements approved by the Board of Regents shall be endorsed by the contractor, firm, or agency, by and through its authorized representatives. On behalf of the System, the contracts shall have signature blocks for the President or his or her designee; and a line indicating “APPROVED by the Board of Regents of the Texas State University System on [date] at [place],” with an attestation signature block for the Chancellor, as Secretary to the Board. The Vice Chancellor and Chief Financial Officer and the Vice Chancellor and General Counsel will indicate their respective reviews of contracts by initialing the contracts below the Chancellor’s signature line.
- 10.5 Form of Motions for Contracts, Purchases and Agreements.
- 10.51 The Motion for any contractual agreement requiring Board approval shall contain the essential details of the transaction, including the following information:
- (1) Parties to the Contract;
 - (2) Subject matter of the Contract;
 - (3) Duration of the Contract, including any potential Amendments extending the Contract; and,

(4) Price or not-to-exceed amount of the Contract, including any Amendments.

10.52 The Explanation to the Motion shall minimally include:

(1) The Subject Matter of the Contract, including the Purpose of the acquisition;

(2) The Source of Funding;

(3) A Statement that it has been or will be reviewed by the Vice Chancellor and Chief Financial Officer and the Vice Chancellor and General Counsel; and,

(4) A Statement verifying that the solicitation method and vendor selection process complies with applicable state laws, TSUS Rules and Regulations, and the TSUS Contract Management Handbook.

10.6 Regental Prerogative. Any Regent who wishes to see and/or discuss a contract or contracts may notify the Chancellor.

10.7 Chancellor-Approved Contracts.

The following contracts must be submitted to the Chancellor for approval:

~~10.22(1) — Contracts, purchases, and agreements in the amount of \$500,000 or more, but less than \$1 million, are subject to approval by the Chancellor. Additionally, the Chancellor retains authority to approve those contracts in the amounts exceeding \$500,000. of \$1 million or more excepted from Board approval under Subparagraph 1.11 of this Chapter.~~

(2) Public Art, regardless of dollar value, acquired under Chapter 3, subparagraph 4 (Construction Procedures & Public Art Program).

(3) Contracts, purchases, and agreements, regardless of dollar value, for electricity or natural gas. Components are authorized, within Presidential spending authority limits, to execute Energy Future Strip agreements. The Component is required to send a copy of the executed agreement to the Vice Chancellor and Chief Financial Officer.

(4) Contracts or Agreements pursuant to Chapter V, Paragraph 4.212.

~~10.23 — All contracts and agreements submitted to the Board or Chancellor shall be submitted for review by the Vice Chancellor and Chief Financial Officer and the Vice Chancellor and General Counsel prior to submission to the Board or Chancellor. The Vice Chancellor and General Counsel shall advise the Board or Chancellor of any contract or agreement that may have adverse legal ramifications.~~

10.8 Presidential Approval.

~~10.25(2)~~ The President may delegate power to contract, purchase, or enter into agreements in amounts of \$500,000 or less, ~~including but not limited to, interlocal contracts with Texas local government entities, and interagency cooperation agreements between a Component and another state agency,~~ to other employees of the Component. Such delegation must be specific and in writing to be effective. The President will remain responsible for all such delegated contracts, purchases, and agreements, and for the proper administration of all grants and agreements funded by private individuals, governmental agencies, and foundations, regardless of delegation of power to contract, purchase, or enter into agreements.

~~10.26(3)~~ The President shall not enter into any faculty or personnel contracts or agreements which are not subject to approval of the Board unless the authority for such action has been previously delegated to the President by the Board (see Paragraph 1.13 of Chapter 5).

10.39 Contract Vendor Employee Background Check Policies. System Components shall engage in due diligence in awarding contracts to vendors of services, who will maintain permanent staffing on the campus.

10.391 Due Diligence on Vendors. Before awarding a contract to a vendor of services, who will permanently place employees on the campus where such employees will be working with or around students, the Component shall:

- (1) During the bidding or negotiation process, notify prospective vendors, in writing, of the requirements of this paragraph;

- (1) A general liability policy, providing primary coverage and naming the Component, System, Regents, and their employees as additional insureds;
- (2) Indemnity and/or hold harmless clauses, protecting the Component, the System, Regents, and their employees from third party claims, caused, in whole or in part, by the actions or omissions of vendor, its

employees, or other persons that the vendor causes to be on the campus;

- (3) A representation by the vendor that it has conducted the following background checks on its officers, employees, or other persons it causes to be on the campus:
 - (a) Sex offender and criminal history databases where the above individuals will be placed permanently on the campus, working with or around students;
 - (b) Criminal history and credit history background checks where the above individuals will be handling money, informational technology, or other security-sensitive areas as determined by the President;
- (4) That the President may require the vendor to remove any person from the campus that, in his or her judgment, poses a danger to health or safety;
- (5) An “independent contractor” clause.

The Texas State University System Board of Regents promotes full and equal opportunity for all businesses to provide the goods and services needed to support the mission, administrative, and logistical operations of System Components. The Board commits its Components to a good faith effort to increase purchases and contract awards with Historically Underutilized Businesses (HUB) firms through race, ethnic, and gender neutral means and consistent with the state's goals for HUB participation and overall social advancement and economic prosperity.~~

~~18.2 Scope. This policy applies to acquisition of commodities, professional and other services, and construction by System Administration and Component Institutions, including auxiliary enterprises, regardless of funding source (treasury or non-treasury funds).~~

~~18.3 Incorporation by Reference. The Historically Underutilized Business Program Rules promulgated by the Comptroller of Public Accounts are adopted into and shall become part of these *Rules and Regulations*.~~

Explanation

4.531 Before being summarily dismissed, a faculty member will be provided with written notice of the allegations against the faculty member together with an explanation of the evidence supporting dismissal and an opportunity for the faculty member to respond to the allegations in a hearing with an administrator designated by the President.

4.532 The designated administrator will consider a faculty member's response and make a written determination whether summary dismissal will proceed. The designated administrator must include in his or her written determination a statement indicating that either a faculty member (i) is subject to summary dismissal, including the effective date of the dismissal and information regarding a faculty member's opportunity to appeal the decision post-dismissal; or (ii) is not subject to summary dismissal.

8. Policy on the Discontinuation of Tenure-Track Appointments at Lamar Institute of Technology, Lamar State College Orange and Lamar State College Port Arthur and the Preservation of Existing Tenure Rights

1. Authority and Purpose

Pursuant to the authority vested in the Texas State University System Board of Regents under applicable state law and institutional policies, this policy establishes a system-wide framework to discontinue the conferral of tenure for future faculty appointments at Lamar Institute of Technology (LIT), Lamar State College Orange (LSCO) and Lamar State College Port Arthur (LSCPA), while safeguarding the rights and status of faculty members at these components who have already been awarded tenure.

2. Policy Provisions

2.1 Discontinuation of Tenure-Track Appointments at LIT, LSCO and LSCPA.

(a) No two-year component shall offer new tenure-track appointments.

(b) All faculty appointments at two-year component institutions shall be made under non-tenure-track or alternative appointment structures.

2.2 Preservation of Tenure Rights for certain faculty at LIT, LSCO and LSCPA.

(a) Faculty members at LIT, LSCO and LSCPA who have been awarded tenure prior to board approval of this policy shall retain their tenured status.

(b) All rights and privileges associated with tenure at these component institutions shall remain in full force and effect, subject to existing *Rules and Regulations*.

2.3 Faculty in Tenure-Track Status.

The administration at these member institutions may transition faculty who are in tenure-track status to alternative appointment structures as deemed appropriate by the component's administration.

4. CODE OF ETHICS.

4.1 Prohibited Actions of Regents. A Member of the Board of Regents shall not:

- (1) Accept or solicit any gift, favor, or service that might reasonably tend to influence the Regent in the discharge of official duties or that the Regent knows or should know is being offered with the intent to influence the Regent's official conduct;
- (2) Accept employment or engage in a business or professional activity the Regent might reasonably expect would require or induce him or her to disclose confidential information acquired by reason of his or her official position or otherwise withhold from the Board information in his or her possession that might reasonably benefit him or her, financially or otherwise, whether directly or indirectly. Further, it is a violation of this *Rule* if the benefit inures to a third party or parties, in whose welfare the Regent is interested;
- (3) Accept other appointments or any employment or compensation that could reasonably be expected to impair the Regent's independence of judgment in the performance of official duties;
- (4) By his or her actions or through his or her silence, allow the Board to consider any matter in which he or she will benefit, financially or otherwise, whether directly or indirectly. Further, it is a violation of this *Rule* if the benefit inures to a third party or parties, in whose welfare the Regent is interested. The Regent shall refrain from commenting on the matter to the Board, its regents or employees; and leave the room while the Board deliberates and votes on the matter;
- (5) Make personal investments that could reasonably be expected to create a substantial conflict between the Regent's private interest and the public interest;
- (6) Intentionally or knowingly solicit, accept, or agree to accept any benefit for having exercised his or her official powers or performed official duties in favor of another; or,
- (7) Commit acts of fraud, dishonesty, or illegality in office, including (by way of example and not limitation) assisting others to obtain personal or financial benefits to which they are not entitled by law or policy; forging or altering checks, bank drafts, or other documents, financial or otherwise; or, knowingly authorizing improper claims.

(8) Pecuniary Interest. No member of the Board of Regents shall enter into the discussion, make motions, or vote on a contract, purchase, or agreement of any character in which the member directly or indirectly has pecuniary interest. The provisions of *Government Code, Chapter 572* shall be observed.

Explanation

The language added to this section was previously located in Chapter III, paragraph 10.1. The language has been added to this section for improved organizational clarity. No substantive changes have been made to the language.

Dr. John Hayek currently Interim President of Lamar State College Port Arthur and Vice Chancellor for Academic and Health Affairs for the Texas State University System, be appointed President of Lamar State College Port Arthur, effective immediately.

Explanation

Dr. Hayek has served as Interim President of Lamar State College Port Arthur (LSCPA) since January 2026. In this role, he has provided strong and steady leadership, strengthening institutional operations, supporting student success initiatives, and advancing LSCPA's role in workforce development across Southeast Texas.

Dr. Hayek brings more than 30 years of leadership experience in higher education, with a record of service at the campus, system, and state levels. In addition to his role as Interim President, he serves as Vice Chancellor for Academic and Health Affairs and Chief Academic Officer for the Texas State University System, where he provides academic leadership across seven institutions.
